



Eburnola Aniyikaiye is the Assistant General Counsel for Digital Technology & Innovation at the American Medical Association (AMA) where she provides regulatory and transactional support to the AMA's mission-related and revenue-generating activities. Ms. Aniyikaiye particularly focuses on digital initiatives in addition to assessing legal and business risks of various courses of action to support AMA initiatives, policies, and procedures. Her substantive portfolio includes but is not limited to a range of digital health issues, such as, interoperability and information blocking, telehealth, SaMD, health IT reimbursement, and other emerging technologies such as artificial intelligence, and blockchain.

Ms. Aniyikaiye currently serves on the Health Law and Policy Program Advisory Council of the American University

Washington College of Law (AUWCL) and as the Membership and Outreach Director for the Society of Health Policy Professionals. She previously served as the Vice Chair of the American Bar Association's Life Sciences Interest Group and Chair of the Seabury Resources for Aging Young Professionals Board.

In a prior role, Ms. Aniyikaiye was a health care regulatory attorney at Epstein Becker & Green, P.C. where she counseled clients on federal and state health care fraud and abuse laws, data privacy laws, and advised public and private clients in the development of legislative and regulatory advocacy strategies involving government health programs.

Before law school, Ms. Aniyikaiye garnered several years of health policy experience. She worked for the Alliance for Health Reform and the American Public Health Association (APHA). At the APHA, she worked directly with 53 state and regional public health association leaders on their policy and advocacy issues in addition to serving as a panelist at APHA's Annual Meeting & Exposition's "Advocacy for Leaders" sessions in 2012, 2013, and 2014.

While attending AUWCL, Ms. Aniyikaiye served as an Articles Editor of the *Administrative Law Review*, the Vice President of the Health Law & Policy Student Association, a Dean's Fellow for the Health Law and Policy Program and was awarded first place in the 24th Annual Kogod Business Case Competition. She also completed a variety of internships to bolster her legal career experience. Specifically, she served as a Health Law Clerk for the U.S. Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions, in the Office of the Ranking Member. Prior to working at the Senate, she was a Legal Intern for both the Marketplace Appeals Group at the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services' Offices of Hearings and Inquiries and for the Administrative Conference of the United States.
